ABOUT THE BRIDGE PROGRAM:

Since 2017 Mission West Virginia's Bridge program has placed Mentors in public high school settings where they support students in foster care, kinship care, or youth experiencing homelessness towards academic success. Each student and their Mentor set personalized goals while focusing on attendance, behavior, and grades. Mentors motivate students to achieve greatness through consistent one on one meetings, educational advocacy, dropout prevention, family engagement, and post-secondary planning. The following report displays our outcomes from the 2022-2023 school year.

THE NEED:

There are currently over 6,400 youth in foster care in West Virginia. WV has the highest number of deaths due to opioid overdoses per capita. Only 58% of youth in care will graduate high school by age 19 with less than 3% of those youth obtaining a college degree by age 25. WV has one of the highest rates of youth being raised by grandparents or other guardians different from their biological parents.

OUR POPULATION:

This year a total of **217*** students were served in the Bridge Program. **189** out of **217** completed the school year with their Mentors. Out of those students:

- 15% Foster Care
- 64% Kinship Care
- 21% McKinney Vento (Legally Homeless)
- 20% of students this year held an IEP/504 plan

*28 students exited the program due to changes in placement, homebound, virtual learning, or program refusal

EVIDENCE BASED RESULTS

What is C&C: The Bridge is implemented and modeled after Check and Connect, a Nationally recognized intervention-based program created by the University of Minnesota for students who show warning signs of disengagement in school and who are at risk of dropping out. Data is tracked annually, measuring student attendance, behavior, and grades.



70% decrease in absences



67% of students had an increase in their overall GPA



89% decrease in suspensions



of 9th, 10th, and 11th grade students advanced to the next grade level



of Seniors graduated with their diploma for the 8th year in a row

GRADUATION

At the end of each school year, we beam with pride as we say our bittersweet goodbyes to the Seniors in the Bridge Program. Some of our 12th graders have been with their Mentors since their Freshman year and the progress they made throughout the years comes to the highlight of graduation.

CONSISTENCY

We understand that change cannot take place and goals cannot be accomplished without consistent Mentoring. Caseload sizes are kept at a range of 30-35 students per Mentor to allow time for each student's unique needs to be assessed. When students realize their mentor will keep showing up for them, we see long term change.

DURING THE 22/23 SCHOOL YEAR MENTORS HELD:

5,159 One-On-One meetings with their students



FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Family engagement starts from day one – not just when a child is struggling in school. Mentors check in with guardians when a student achieves goals or is making progress at school.

When guardians hear from us it is not just to receive bad news, it is also to celebrate their child and helps them to understand that we value their role and want to include them in the narrative of their child's education.




FILLING THE GAPS

Birth certificates were purchased from vital statistics and 23 juniors and seniors were transported to the DMV. Once there, students had the opportunity to take their learners permit test and get official ID's which they will use to achieve their future plans.


